1. Our common welfare should come first; Personal recovery depends upon Jan CoDA unity. 2. For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority – A loving Feb higher power as expressed to our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern. 3. The only requirement for membership in CoDA is a desire for healthy and Mar loving relationships. 4. Each group should remain autonomous except in matters affection other Aprl groups or CoDA as a whole. 5. Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to other May co-dependents who still suffer. 6. A CoDA group ought never endorse, finance or lend the CoDA name to June any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary spiritual aim. Every CoDA group ought to b fully self-supporting, declining outside 7. July contributions. 8. Co-Dependents anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers. Aug 9. CoDA, as such, ought never be organized; but we may crate service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve. Sep 10. CoDA has no opinion on outside issues; hence the CoDA name ought never be drawn into public controversy. Oct 11. Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; Nov we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films. 12. Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions; ever reminding Dec us to place principles before personalities.
